The Secor Apple

We have always regarded Secor as an apple of top quality. The fruit keeps well in storage until May. Secor seems to be making progress in Wisconsin as a commercial variety. In Iowa fire blight has been serious for some time, and the trees appear to be even more susceptible than are Jonathan trees. This has led to discouragement of course, and we do not feel that we can recommend Secor for Iowa because of its susceptibility to blight. —H. L. Lantz, Ames, Iowa.
