Report of Annual Meeting of the American Pomological Society

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The seventy-fifth annual meeting of the American Pomological Society was held in the Memorial Center of Purdue University, January 5 to 7, 1961. This was a joint meeting with the Indiana State Horticultural Society, which was celebrating its centennial at that time.

True-to-Name Nursery Inspection Program Chairman, Dr. A. P. French has announced that the Massachusetts inspection team plans to incorporate certification of clonal rootstocks for trueness-to-name into its program during 1961.

Variety Nomenclature and Appraisal Committee Chairman, Dr. R. M. Brooks, has announced that members of his Committee are planning to publish articles in Fr. Var. & Hort. Dig. in the near future, dealing with matters related to nomenclature.

A Committee for Tropical and Sub-Tropical Fruits was revived, with Dr. John Popenoe, of Homestead, Florida, as chairman.

The first two awards for best articles in Fr. Var. & Hort. Dig. were announced by Dr. A. L. Havis, who had coordinated the judging. The prize consists of either the five most recent volumes of the Digest, bound between hard covers, or a book of the winner's choice (price limit being set by the Secretary). The authors of the best articles in Vol. 14 were as follows:

Dr. G. M. Darrow, for his article entitled "Strawberry Varieties—Past, Present and Future" (Vol. 14, No. 1, pages 7 to 10).

Paul Stark, Jr., for his article en-

titled "Fruit Growing in the South Pacific" (Vol. 14, No. 4, pages 65 to 68).

Wilder Awards Committee Chairman, Dr. H. B. Tukey, announced the award of the only Wilder silver medal for 1960 to Dr. R. P. White for his outstanding contributions to the fruit industry.

Future meetings. The next annual meeting will be held jointly with the Ontario Fruit and Vegetable Association, January 15, 16 and 17, 1962, in Toronto, Canada. The following meeting will be in Yakima, Washington, December 2, 3, and 4, 1962, with the Washington State Horticultural Association.

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authors reflect an ever-increasing in-
terest on the part of fruit breeders
and testers in Fruit Varieties and
Horticultural Digest. The growing
demand for back-issues is also very
gratifying.

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Apple Disease Possibly Due to Bud Mutation

"Striped Cracking", an apple disorder found only on the Kidd's Orange Red apple in New Zealand, may be due to bud mutation rather than a virus. Reasons given by scientists are that no other variety show the symptoms, and that when healthy trees are topworked with affected scions, the disorder does not appear to be transmitted to healthy parts of the tree.
