Stone Fruit Varieties for Arizona

Stone fruit varieties are being tested at the Mesa Experiment Station of the University of Arizona.

Peaches: Springtime is the earliest white-fleshed variety, and Blazing Gold is the earliest yellow-fleshed variety being tested. The latter shows a tendency to split pits, according to Leland Burkhart, Head of Horticulture. Some of the better varieties include Robin, Meadow Lark, Starking Delicious, Red Wing, and Early Elberta.

Plums: Beauty is good, Hollywood is excellent for the garden, having purple-bronze leaves, pink blossoms and blood red fruit. Other fine varieties are Mariposa, Santa Rosa, Climax, Duarte, Kelsey.
