lent even if not as fine as Comice, which in Nova Scotia, produces small crops. Magness produces heavily. Thinning will probably be required to secure the most desired size of fruit. Its appearance under Nova Scotia conditions is good, but no better.

Included in the variety trial orchard at the Kentville Research Station, are trees of Beierschmitt, which has excellent eating quality. The fruit is somewhat rough. The trees bear so heavily that they generally grow very slowly. Clara Frijs, an old Danish pear which ripens in early October, is a smooth, regular, medium-sized pear, having good quality. The trees produce heavily.

Pierre Corneille, which in Nova Scotia is a pear for the early storage period, is also medium in size, and of good plus quality even if not as fine as Magness.

Fire blight is fortunately not known to exist in Nova Scotia.—R. P. Longley, Research Station, Kentville, N. S.



## Robison, a New Peach for the South

A new peach variety, Robison (Plant Pat. 2,163), has been introduced to the trade from South Carolina. This new variety was found as a chance seedling in a block of Dixired peach trees owned by Mr. John B. Robison, Route 1, Greer, South Carolina, and was found to have characteristics worthy of propagation and introduction. The fruit is extremely attractive having bright red cheeks and having a bright golden ground color defused with red. It is symmetrical in shape and is smooth having smooth suture line and having less tendency to flaten than Rio Oso Gem. Its flavor is sweet and mild with firm and melting flesh texture. The flesh is light yellow, tends to nonbrowning, and the stone is of the free type. It is not excessively red around the pit.

The Robison is a good and regular bearer with the tree size medium and vigor average. The blossom is large and showy and pink in color. The chilling requirement has not been accurately determined but it is indicated that it will fall in the medium group since the blooming date has been midseason. The ripening date of this peach is after J. H. Hale and Elberta and a few days before Rio Oso Gem. It seems to fill a need for a good variety ripening at this time.

## Vesper Strawberry from New Jersey

A new strawberry, Vesper has been introduced by the New Jersey Agr. Exp. Station, and will be available from nurseries in Spring, 1963. It is a cross of Jerseybelle × Utah Shipper. It is a late, good quality berry for fresh market. Vesper is very vigorous, and productive, but is susceptible to Verticillium wilt and red-stele.



## Promising Newer Peaches

Earlired is a highly colored, fairly firm variety, just before Dixiered. Sunhaven, maturing just before Redhaven is rather firm. Of the later varieties, Washington is promising for Golden Jubilee season, Redglobe for Halehaven season, Jefferson for Elberta season:—The late Leon Havis, U.S.D.A.
