

The Newer Blueberries

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The newer varieties of the cultivated blueberries will appeal to all who are interested in new fruits, particularly the small fruits.

Pemberton is one of the best in vigor, hardiness, productiveness, quality and size of berry. This variety is worthy of trial as an outstanding addition to the

cultivated blueberry family. It ripens late mid-season.

Burlington is perhaps the best of the late ripening sorts, being the latest ripening variety thus far introduced. While the individual berries are not quite as large as some, it is a heavy yielder, particularly while quite young.

Dixi produces the largest berries of any variety. It ripens mid-season and yields well. Dixi should be tested by all growers of blueberries.

Stanley is a vigorous grower with especially large thick shiny leaves. This variety is considered the best flavored of the cultivated blueberries and should be included for home use and market.

Atlantic is not quite as large a bush as some but is a vigorous, high yielding variety when the bushes attain full size. The individual berries are next largest in size to Dixi. Atlantic is difficult to propagate.

June is a very early ripening variety, with a medium-large light-blue berry. It is inferior to the later ripening varieties and is of value only because of its earliness.

Weymouth is the earliest ripening of the cultivated blueberries. Aside from extreme earliness, it does not rate high when compared with the later ripening types.
