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### Apple Variety Recommendations for Commercial Growers in England

Keith Seabrook, noted fruit grower in England stated in a recent issue of *The Grower* that apples imported by England from the U. S. and Europe are commanding prices of \$1.40 to \$2.80 more per bushel than are English apples. It is his contention that English growers would fare better if they grow only the varieties that do best for them. He suggests the following varieties, listed by season:

**George Cave**—best early, dessert apple; good producer and an excellent pollinator for Cox Orange.

**Tydeman's Early**—Danger of picking it too early, or of its overlapping with early picking of Worcester Permain.

**Worcester Permain.**

**Egremont Russett**—has been bringing excellent prices.

**Kidd's Orange Red and Tydeman's Late Orange**—very worth growing, especially with present methods for control of mildew and russett.

**Ingrid Marie**—has high quality, dark color, but sometimes lacks size.

**Acme**—a fine gold colored apple, which tends to be biennial, but is annual on Malling-Merton stocks.

**Spartan**—dark red, and of good quality after Christmas.

**Mutsu**—has potential as a green apple; of good quality in November.

**Cox Orange**—an apple for October to March that grows to perfection in England.

**Bramley**—best variety in England for cooking.
